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## 109TH CONGRESS SCORECARD (2005-2006)

The National Tax Limitation Committee (NTLC) was organized in 1975 to seek constitutional and other limits on taxes, spending and deficits at the federal, state and local levels of government. In keeping with this mission, NTLC analyzes the voting records of United States Senators and Representatives, as it has done for over 20 years. NTLC's scorecard is carried in Michael Barone's "Almanac of American Politics." This report on the 109th Congress covers the period from January 2005 through August 2006.

**Criteria for Congressional Ratings:** Each score is reflective of the individual's public position on key votes. Some 34 House and 40 Senate votes were used in the preparation of this scorecard. In selecting votes, NTLC placed special emphasis on tax, budget and appropriation measures that would have a major impact on long-term taxing and spending programs of the government. Also selected were votes that may have relatively small fiscal consequences in a particular year but nevertheless provide a good "litmus test" of the attitude or philosophy of the legislator with respect to government regulation, private property rights, federalism and the size of the federal government.

Every action considered for this rating – floor votes on bills or amendments, votes on procedural motions, etc. – has been weighed and tallied to present an accurate "fiscal responsibility" score for each Member. The votes used in this scorecard are listed below.

The 109th Congress made progress on tax cuts proposed by the President and various Members, general taxpayer organizations, associations and individuals. However, despite the necessity to increase spending on defense, intelligence and homeland security, domestic spending was not constrained. Both so-called mandatory and discretionary spending have grown rapidly. While deficits are to be abhorred, increased government spending is worse. It is the size of government that is the key barometer for NTLC.

NTLC placed special emphasis on killing the federal death (estate) tax, as it has in the past. In '05 the House passed HR 8 (permanent and full repeal of the death tax) overwhelmingly. On June 8, 2006, the Senate voted on a cloture motion on HR 8. Proponents garnered 57 votes but not the 60 votes required. Patience and planning for a subsequent vote was the proper strategy. However, the Chairman of the House Ways & Means Committee rushed ahead and devised a "compromise" measure and shoved it through the House. Only two Republicans – **John Doolittle** (R-CA) and **Todd Tiahrt** (R-KA) had the sense and courage to oppose this ill-conceived measure. We have given them extra credit for this important "no" vote which has not been used otherwise in our computations.

Votes were selected in the 109th Congress to give a sharper picture of those Members willing to cut spending, especially in the House. Reps. **Joel Hefley** (R-CO) and **Jeff Flake** (R-AZ) introduced a series of amendments to cut general appropriations and specific earmarks. Such votes provided a special opportunity to test a Member's commitment to fiscal discipline. The 70-100 House Members who regularly voted for the Hefley/Flake proposals tend to be members of the **Republican Study Committee** and fiscal conservatives around whom we must build and expand a spending-control cadre for the 110th Congress and beyond.

**Voting Scores for Members of Congress in Percentage and Letter Grades:** Scores for Members of the House and Senate are expressed in percentages of all votes cast on those selected by NTLC. The Member may or may not have been present and voting on each and every roll call; the percentage reflects actual votes only. A Member was not penalized for missing up to three votes. A perfect score, one most favorable to the taxpayer, in our view, is 100%. The worst score is 0%. To convert percentages to letter grades, use the following schedule: 80-100% = A; 60-79% = B; 40-59% = C; 20-39% = D; under 19% = F. (Members in several districts resigned or otherwise left office during the 109th Congress; only the scores of their successors are set forth here. Sen. Menendez (D-NJ) was appointed at the beginning of '06. His House votes in '05 have been added to his '06 Senate votes and constitute his score.)

**How to Read the Scorecard:** Following the state name, the two United States Senators are listed first (in bold print), then the Representatives opposite their district numbers. Democrats are in italics. The right-hand column lists the percentage scores.
