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### 112<sup>th</sup> CONGRESS SCORECARD (2011-2012)

The National Tax Limitation Committee (NTLC) was organized in 1975 to seek constitutional and other limits on taxes, spending and deficits at the federal, state and local levels of government. In keeping with this mission, NTLC analyzes the voting records of United States Senators and Representatives, as it has done for more than a quarter-century. This report on the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress covers the period from January 2011 through August 2012.

Criteria for congressional ratings: Each score is reflective of the Member's public position on key votes. Some 30 House and 23 Senate votes were used in the preparation of the scorecard. In selecting votes, NTLC placed special emphasis on tax, budget and appropriation measures that would have a major impact on long-term taxing and spending programs of the government. Also selected were votes that may have relatively small fiscal consequences in a particular year but nevertheless provide a good "litmus test" of the attitude or philosophy of the legislator with respect to government regulation, private property rights, federalism and the size of the federal government. Every action considered for this rating – floor votes on bills or amendments, votes on procedural motions, etc. – has been weighed and tallied to present an accurate "fiscal responsibility score" for each Member. The votes used in this scorecard are listed on the back cover.

The November 2010 election results dramatically changed the composition of the United States House of Representatives for the benefit of taxpayers. As a result, the House acted firmly and swiftly on budget and other fiscal issues, only to have the liberal Reid-led Senate and the Obama White House stonewall the budget and "legislate" through executive orders of the White House and through rules and regulations of the White House-controlled "administrative agencies," such as the Environmental Protection Agency, the National Labor Relations Board and others. Meanwhile, federal spending soared under a President intent on making America a European-style welfare state, who imposed Obamacare and other explosive spending programs on the Nation. Both so-called mandatory and discretionary spending have grown rapidly. While deficits are to be abhorred, increased government spending is worse. It is the size of government that is the key barometer for NTLC, as our late mentor and founder of NTLC, Milton Friedman, underscored regularly. At approximately 40% of Gross Domestic Product (GDP), spending at all levels of government is far above the optimal level to assure maximum national economic growth. On the taxpayer-protection front, during the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress, NTLC fought alongside our allies to build support for killing the death tax. That remains one of our key objectives in the next Congress, as does reducing tax rates generally.

Votes were selected in the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress to underscore those Members opposed to new government programs and willing to cut spending. Such votes provided a special opportunity to test a Member's commitment to fiscal discipline. A careful review of the voting records of those Members in House districts that changed party control in the 2010 elections was especially revealing. The number of strong fiscal conservatives elected in 2010 – and what this can mean for our Nation's future – may be exemplified best by calculations we have made: we added the total pro-taxpayer scores of all House Members of the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress (2009-2010) and compared that figure with the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress total. Here is what we found: the 111<sup>th</sup> total was 18,117 combined voting scores. In the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress, the House pro-taxpayer total jumped to 23,762, a 30% increase. Our Nation's solvency depends on increasing the number of fiscal conservatives in the United States Senate and changing the guard in the White House.

**Voting Scores for Members of Congress in Percentage and Letter Grades:** Scores for Members of the House and Senate are expressed in percentages of all votes cast on those selected by NTLC. The Member may or may not have been present and voting on each and every roll call; the percentage reflects actual votes only. A Member was not penalized for missing up to three votes. A perfect score, one most favorable to the taxpayer, in our view, is 100%. The worst score is 0%. To convert percentages to letter grades, use the following schedule: 80-100% = A; 60-79%=B; 40-59%=C; 20-39%=D; under 19%=F. (Members in several states and districts died, resigned or otherwise left office during the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress; only the scores of their successors are set forth here.)

**How to Read the Scorecard:** Following the state name, the two United States Senators are listed first (in bold print), then the Representatives opposite their district numbers. Democrats are in italics. The right-hand column lists the percentage scores.
